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Jewish Communities

Jewish people have a wide variety of culture and beliefs depending on their ancestral place of origin. Generally, Jewish communities are broken up in to 4 main groups.

Ashkenazi- Members of this group can usually trace their ancestry back to Germany or other Eastern European countries. The traditions of this culture are the ones most Americans are familiar with.

Sephardic- This group originated in Spain, Portugal and North Africa. The first Jewish people in the North American colonies which would later become the United States were Sephardic Jewish people.

Mizrahi- This group originated in the Middle East and their earliest communities date back to antiquity. Some of the oldest Mizrahi communities came from what are now modern-day Iraq, Iran and Yemen.

Ethiopian- As the name implies, this group originated and still lives in Ethiopia, although in the 1980s and 1990s many immigrated to Israel. Ethiopian Jews have existed for at least 15 centuries.
